Who are the **School Development Group?** We are a group of Drumduan staff, parents, alumni and trustees who have formed to work together towards a sustainable and healthy future in response to the current financial deficit and staffing issues. We are open and actively welcoming anyone in the school community who feels called to join us. We meet fortnightly for two hours and are currently held by Sarah-Jane Mills (parent, Upper School). We are democratic and open- everyone has a voice and can present proposals and opinions. We debate and discuss and then present proposals or offers to the Core Group and the Trustees.

That all sounds lovely but who are you accountable to? How do you ensure consistent follow through?

We are accountable to Core Group, the Trustees, and the Parents. Each proposal or initiative we offer to hold will first be taken to Core Group and Trustees by the person responsible. If approved, it will be introduced to the community too, with opportunities for feedback. Each initiative will be held by one key person with responsibility for progress and communication.

We will give monthly progress updates and consultation by email or in meetings. Simultaneously, we offer an opportunity to hold new ideas or support the parent body to voice concerns or suggestions.
